peoples across the globe who are subjected to war and are suffering its consequences, Pope Francis said, "Let us not forget martyred Ukraine and let us think of the Palestinian and Israeli peoples: may the Lord bring a just peace."

"There is so much suffering," he said, as he neared the end of his weekly General Audience. "There is so much suffering."

"Children are suffering; the sick are suffering, and many young people are dying," the Pope continued. "War is always a defeat. Let us not forget: War is always a defeat."

Archbishop's Appeal





Reflection

In today's readings, Paul is writing to the Thessalonians about eternal life. He encourages them to be people of hope, since we believe in the promise of eternal life. But this hope becomes tested in those moments of sickness and injury. The gospel speaks about the importance of preparedness. Still, in our culture today, there are fewer religious resources to draw on in the preparation for dying than in years past. Living in a despiritualized world, death and dying can become quite fearful. It is essential to address the spiritual needs of those preparing for death in ways that communicate that same hope Paul is drawing us into. Hospital chaplaincy, education about medical treatment decision-making, and pastoral care for the sick are crucial to help navigate the road we all must take. Your contribution to the appeal helps to fund this vital work, so that those who are most vulnerable may have the peace that comes from having hope.

Did you know... Standing Buffalo Dakota First Nation is located 6 miles west of Fort Qu'Appelle, Sask. This Nation named after Chief Standing Buffalo (Tatankanaje/Tatanka Najin) is not a sig-

natory to Treaty 4 but are protected under the Indian Act. The Canadian government refused to recognize that the Dakota had land in Treaty 4 (https://www.cbc.ca/news/ canada/saskatchewan/ottawa-rejects-claims-by-dakotalakota-first-nations-1.669072 territory because as descendants of Chief Sitting Bull they were viewed as American refugees. It has one of the best reserve-based lacrosse programs (https://www.standingbuffalodakotanation.com/ lacrosse) in North America. It became a powerhouse program winning league, provincial, and national Championships.
