

Offering of the Mass

St. Thérèse



When St. Therese was fifteen, she asked the Pope for permission to enter the Carmelite order, even though she was too young. When she began her postulancy she took the name "Sr. Therese of the Child Jesus and the Holy Face." She dedicated her life to simple acts, for she be-

lieved that it was the small daily tasks that made one holy. This became known as St. Therese's "Little Way". It is the way we are called to do ordinary things with extraordinary love.

Stewardship Bulletin Bits March 9, 2025 1st Sunday of Lent

"I have now brought you the first fruits of the products of the soil which you, O Lord, have given to me." - Deuteronomy 26:10

This line from the Old Testament offers two challenges. First, do you give to God from your "first fruits" - the first and best that you have to offer? Or do you give what you have left over? Second, do you realize that everything you have and that everything you are has been given to you by God? We aren't owners of anything; we are merely stewards of God's gifts. Pray for a grateful and generous heart every day, in all circumstances.

Readings for the 1st Sunday of Lent

First Reading – <u>Deuteronomy 26:4-10</u>: Moses instructs the people to offer their firstfruits to God, remembering their ancestors' journey, oppression in Egypt, and God's deliverance and gift of the promised land.

Responsorial Psalm – <u>Psalm 91</u>: Trust in God, who protects and rescues those who call on Him. He commands His angels to guard you and promises to be with you in trouble, delivering and honoring you.

Second Reading – Romans 10:8-13: Confess that Jesus is Lord and believe God raised him, and you will be saved. There is no distinction; all who call on the Lord will be saved.

Gospel – <u>Luke 4:1-13</u>: Jesus was led by the Spirit into the desert and tempted by the devil. He resisted by quoting Scripture, and the devil left him for a time.
