

"Jesus approaches us and wants to come stay with us. Are you ready to change your ways, like Zacchaeus, to follow Jesus?" (Luke 19:1-10)

Archbishop's Appeal



As we read the gospel story for this Sunday about the story of Zacchaeus, most of us have no trouble visualizing him, a short man who climbed the sycamore tree so he could see Jesus as the Lord passed. Zacchaeus was on the verge of something important, but

he probably did not go up in the tree so Jesus would notice him; he climbed the tree because he was seeking Jesus.

Zacchaeus was wealthy. He was wealthy because he had overcollected taxes from the people. They hated him, but as Jesus reminds us all at the end of the Gospel passage, "For the Son of Man has come to seek and to save what was lost." Zacchaeus was not a good steward of his blessings. Jesus was aware of that when he went to Zacchaeus' home to be fed. Something important happened to Zacchaeus; he went through a conversion experience an encounter with Christ, an event that changed his life. He began to share with special regard to the poor. He began to reach out to those whom he had mistreated. God calls us and interested with us as He did with Zacchaeus. He continuously invites himself to us in our own hearts; he says, "I want to stay at your house today!" If we respond to this invitation like Zacchaeus did, a transformation of mind and heart will ensue. What will follow will be to reach out to others especially to those who are destitute, both spiritually and actually. Like Zacchaeus, sharing our blessings is responding to God's call of love and mercy to those most in need among his children. Sharing our financial blessings to the Archdiocesan Annual Appeal accomplishes our goal of reaching out to others in charity - especially to God's children who are destitute both spiritually and actually. Plenary Indulgence for our beloved Dead

The month of November, especially All Souls Day (November 2), is a traditional time for visiting graves of loved ones, as the anniversary of death. On the first eight days of November, that is, November 1-8, we may gain a plenary indulgence not for ourselves but for our departed brothers and sisters.

How do we gain plenary indulgence for our beloved dead? We may gain plenary indulgence for our beloved dead by fulfilling the following conditions:

- 1. We visit a cemetery, where the dead members of our family is buried. If it is impossible for us to visit the cemetery where the remains of our beloved dead are laid to rest, we can visit any cemetery.
- 2. We pray for our beloved dead (e.g. responsory for the dead)
- 3. We attend Mass and receive Holy Communion. This can be done before or after we have visited a cemetery and prayed for our dead.
- 4. We pray for the intentions of Holy Father (e.g. Our Father, Hail Mary, Glory Be)
- 5. The plenary indulgence applied for our beloved dead can only be gained once a day.

On other days of the year, only partial indulgence for our dead is gained. Why do we do all these for our dead? We offer our prayers, Masses, indulgent acts on their behalf since they can no longer do all these for themselves. We make reparation for the sins and the consequences of the sins our loved ones had committed which they might not have done while they were still alive.
