




Hospital Chaplains

Archbishop's Appeal

In this year's Appeal, Archbishop Don reminded us that "when we place our hope in God, who transforms darkness into light and death into life, we learn that all things are possible." As we move through the coming week, let

us reflect on a time in our life when God carried us through a seemingly impossible time. Let us consider how our donation to the Appeal can inspire hope in the lives of those around us.

Reflection

Today is the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. The readings focus on the reality that gift, the inheritance, that Christ the King gives us is the gift of eternal life. The first and second readings explore this in the anointing of King David and Saint Paul's account of the divinity of Christ. Life itself was made through Christ, and it is Christ who reconciles the world back to God. The earthly rulers sneered at Christ on the Cross, not realizing that this was the ultimate act of love and devotion to God. When the criminal asks for eternal life, Jesus says, "today you will be with me in Paradise." This shows us that our inheritance is secure, since only the King of the Universe could make such a promise. The Church works to promote social justice in the world. In keeping government accountable by enacting just legislations, to promoting equity and solidarity among all people, your support to the Annual Appeal directly supports the office of Social Justice in the ministry of promoting the reality of Christ the King.
